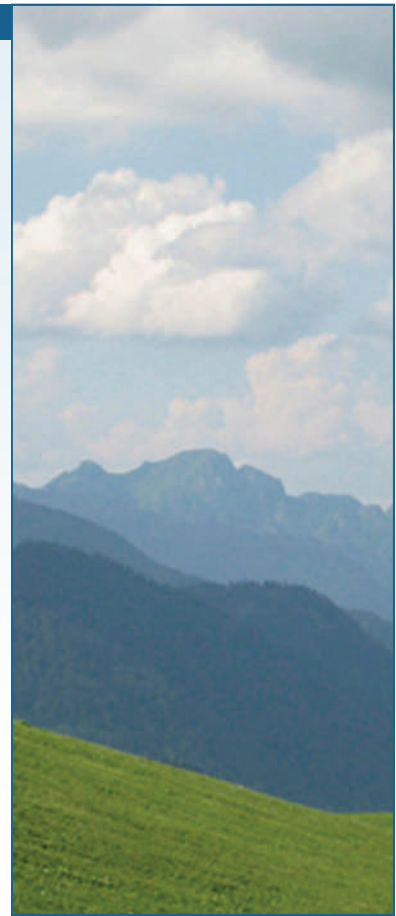

The Christian and Suffering: Part III

One of the more difficult issues we struggle with has to do with suffering and the Christian. How do we account for it? We know that, "...if God is for us, who can be against us?" (Rom 8:31). However, we can often feel as though God is either strangely absent or perhaps even directly opposed to us. From Paul's numerous statements in Scripture, we understand that any Christian who chooses to live for the gospel *will* find persecution. To a world that has consistently shown itself hostile to the message, anyone who proclaims that gospel can expect the same treatment even now.

However, does Paul's theology of suffering include *anything* that happens to us, even if that misfortune has nothing to do with persecution or with our identification with Christ? Does Paul's encouragement apply as well when a Christian gets a disease, loses a loved one in a car crash, or encounters abandonment by a mate? One commentator seems to reason that this kind of suffering is to be received in the same manner, seeing that "every affliction and every frustration becomes an obstacle to fulfilling the goal of serving Christ. It would be impossible to think that believers who...suffer no physical persecution or religious discrimination are thereby deprived of an essential element in their sanctification."¹ Not all agree however, seeing this view as a doctrine that is inferred rather than one obtained through a study of what Bible texts openly state.² This inferred reasoning, however, seems to be aligned with Paul's comments about his own suffering. It is believed that Paul had at least one type of physical affliction that hindered him from carrying the gospel to the degree that he would have liked. Some believe that he suffered from an eye ailment based upon his comment in Gal. 4:15 that the Galatians would have "plucked out [their] eyes" and given them to Paul, though this could just be an idiom of the day.³ Paul's own writings reveal to us that there was something that hindered him in his progress in order to keep him from becoming too proud. He called it his "thorn in the flesh" (2 Cor. 12:7) sent to him through a messenger of Satan, though the Scriptures do not give us any clarity as to whether it was a physical, spiritual, or mental problem. *Nevertheless, Paul had something which caused him suffering that was not necessarily as a result of the gospel, but was a means by which God would keep him humble.* This seems to be more in line with the conclusion proposed by the commentator. Any kind of suffering that might hinder us from proclaiming, promoting, and living the gospel can align with the kind of suffering Paul calls all Christians to embrace and endure.

Are you suffering today? Is the cause of your suffering rooted in a stand for the gospel, or merely from catching a disease? Is it because you have spoken for Christ, or because difficulties have come to your doorstep and burst into your front door? Is it a personal attack because of your beliefs, or is it the emotional torment you encounter because of a loved one's illness? No matter what your circumstances, God can and does use it for your good and your sanctification. While we too can and ought to ask God to remove those circumstances, we must remember that He is making us more like Christ through this circumstance as we are humbled, shown weak, and forced to become more dependent upon Him. It is yet another area in which we are to "...give thanks. For this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." (1 Thessalonians 5:18)

God is at work in *all* of your circumstances! Do not forget the truth of 2 Cor. 12:9-10:

And He has said to me, "My grace is enough for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." So then, I will boast most gladly about my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may reside in me. Therefore I am content with weaknesses, with insults, with troubles, with persecutions and difficulties for the sake of Christ, for whenever I am weak, then I am strong.

Administratively Speaking

Blue Ridge Community Builder is coming! As part of our strategic planning, we realized that we needed to update and upgrade our 10-year-old database system to a web-based service so that it could be available to the entire church family and not just the church administrative staff. Our old system did not allow for pastors and elders to easily access important information needed for ministry. We also wanted a system that would provide more tools to ministry leaders while not sacrificing security and privacy.

In August, we contracted with Community Church Builder (CCB), a 10-year-old Christian-owned and operated company to use their information/database system. Since then I have been learning how to use it and setting it up as our own customized "community" which we have named Blue Ridge Community Builder.

Here are some of the exciting benefits for our congregation:

- Our LIFE group participants can easily communicate with each other in their groups regularly with prayer needs, activities, and group discussions.
- Some tools are available for other church ministries, missions teams or special interest groups for improved communication
- There's also an ability for the church family to post various needs to the individual groups or congregation
- We can use it to sign up for events, retreats or even potlucks church wide or by groups
- Each individual can securely access his/her personal information from any computer and keep it updated as well as set personal privacy and security parameters choosing who can or cannot see your contact information. This will allow us to eliminate the directory and give everyone more control of their personal information.
- The church staff and elders can use it to better shepherd the congregation in many ways
- Tracking your giving record is much easier and can be done by you through your personal profile
- Individuals can continue or can sign up to donate through online giving
- It also has personal, church wide, and group calendars for viewing all activities and building uses at any time by our congregation. There's also a public calendar connected to our website for the public to get a glimpse of our services or special events, but without having access within our "community" directly.

Access to the system will be limited to our congregation only; no one can get on without a login password. Even within the system, each person will be able to choose who can read their entire information or parts of it. It is our hope to make it available to everyone sometime in November, so look for an explanatory email from me and then one from CCB with your personal login and password. Many videos and articles are available in the "help" feature to assist everyone in learning the system quickly. Basically, if I can do it, so can you. I am looking forward to building the Blue Ridge community...with you!

Our annual clothing exchange on October 15 concluded with over 660+ people taking part in this incredible, practical ministry. Galatians 6:10, *“Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people especially to those who belong to the family of believers.”* For this reason, our clothing exchange seeks to assist those in our Body and also to those outside our church. We saw example upon example of how the Lord blessed our meager efforts to minister to our Body and to our community. Each day we had almost 100 people come through the sanctuary helping us and seeking to meet their practical needs of clothing. There are several stories that stand out as examples of ministry.

Our visiting missionaries came to find a few clothing items. The Belize missionary, Sharon Humb, came through and found several gems to take back with her on the mission field. Stephen Aputara, our Ghanaian missionary, found a suit that fit him perfectly! He also picked up a few well used suitcases donated by the Holmans to take back with him to Ghana. You can easily see how the Lord used missionaries to minister to missionaries through the clothing exchange. HE knows our needs and meets them!

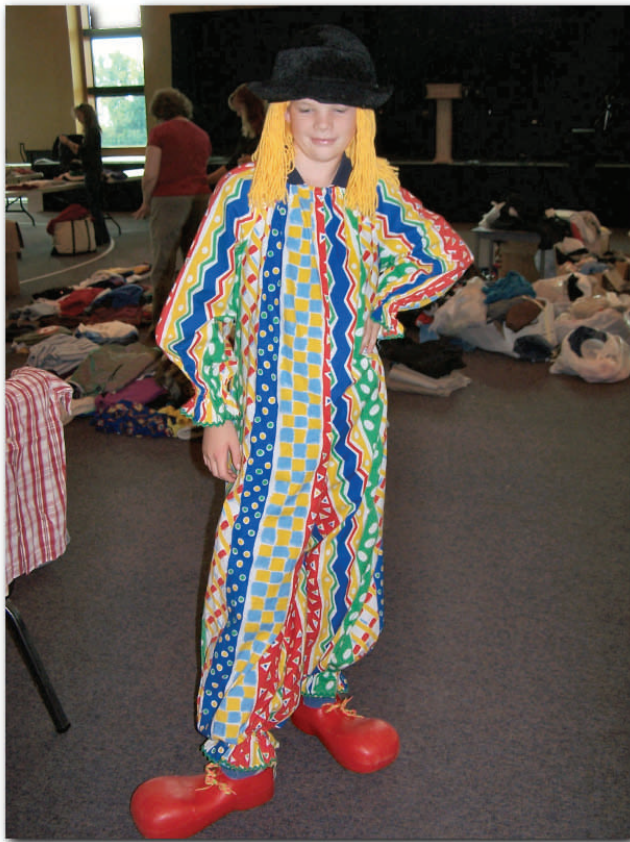


On Thursday, the Purcellville family that lost their house recently to fire came to find some items that had not been donated to them. One item was a size 10 bathing suit that had just been donated that morning! It was a Lands End suit hardly even worn. Each item of need was checked off their list as they searched the tables and found just the perfect item needed. When families made their donations, they had no way of knowing how the Lord would use them to minister to others in a practical way.



We had several other non-Blue Ridge families come during the week too. One single mom came with her four children and found much needed shoes and winter clothing. She was so touched by our kindness and generosity that she brought back her aunt and uncle and neighbors! She expressed interest in getting involved in our church with Awana. Our outreach spoke volumes to her of our love for Christ and willingness to minister to others. She ended up coming back four times with different people we could minister to! God used her to help us reach those in need.

Out of the 660+ people who passed through the sanctuary for the clothing exchange, over 200+ do not attend our church and the majority were unbelievers. Marion Esposito and her team set up a table to share the Gospel with those who came and Courtney Shipe made 12 dozen homemade muffins to hand out. It was a practical example of feeding the lost both physically and spiritually. Our leftover clothing were given to Free Life Church in Leesburg to be distributed on October 29 to needy families in the Heritage Square Apartments in Leesburg. God is still at work blessing others!



The history of the clothing exchange goes back 16 years. Our own, Bev Ruybalid, started the exchange when she moved here with her family from Sterling. We didn't have a building then so she worked with Purcellville Baptist Church to use their building. We have worked with Purcellville Baptist each year since then to host the clothing exchange. In 2008, Purcellville Baptist moved into their new building. They now host the spring outreach clothing exchange while we continue to host the fall clothing exchange. It is incredible to see the abundance the Lord has blessed each of us with and how we can use our tangible resources to reach into our community and bless others. *"Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask, or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, forever and ever! Amen!"* Ephesians 3:20-21

This past July I had the opportunity to travel to Thailand with a team from Liberty University to share the love of Christ with the people there. While overseas I had the incredible opportunity to see God's hand at work in a country so completely shrouded in darkness.

We were involved in various ministries including teaching English at overnight camps for kids and also leading games and activities such as skits and music. Through skits we portrayed the gospel message in a way that was intriguing and many of the children responded positively to the message.

Thailand is primarily a Buddhist country and therefore difficult to reach and receive response. There are plenty of instances where God was evident but there is one that has a special place in my heart. The first weekend after our team arrived, a few of us talked to four girls for over an hour about Christianity, salvation and Jesus. After asking many questions they wanted to hear why we believed in Jesus. This provided the opportunity for us to share our testimonies and how Christ has transformed our lives. We invited them to come to church the next day and they came. Afterward, God displayed His loving pursuit of these girls because each one accepted Christ that day. God's hand was evident in the lives of these four young teenagers.

Thailand is not a place where salvations are a regular occurrence, especially on short-term trips. Missionaries have to work to build relationships with the Thai people so that they can see the difference between Christianity and Buddhism in life. I have since been keeping contact with the girls occasionally over Facebook and it has been such a blessing. God is truly at work.

Also, during our stay we taught in schools and Sunday schools. One day we helped a low-income school empty out and organize and clean a huge, dirty, cluttered, outdoor closet. It was so dirty it looked like it hadn't been touched in years. They were enthusiastically thankful, and we later learned that what we did in two days would have taken them two months to accomplish alone. We were simply able to love the people and show them the love of Christ.

Though the focus of the trip was to serve, I was personally stretched and challenged to grow in my faith and trust in God's plan. I learned a lot about prayer and the power it truly has. In Thailand it is so necessary to be in prayer and I saw literal, physical answers to prayer on numerous occasions. I do not know why I was always surprised when He answered but I have been learning to pray expectantly—to pray and really believe He can do what says He can.

Thailand is a beautiful, welcoming, tropical land surrounded by darkness, despair and emptiness. It is a nation waiting, searching for hope. I believe that God can work a miracle in Thailand and bring countless numbers to salvation. Prayer is powerful and my hope is to see the beautiful Thai people fall in love with Jesus and shatter the darkness with His eternal light.

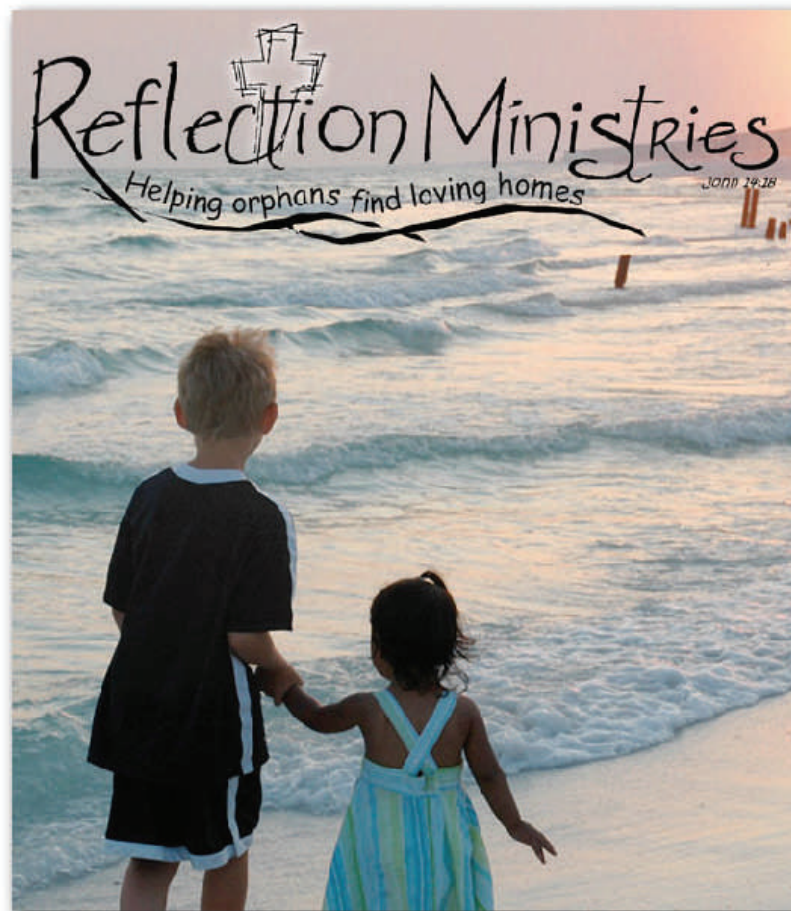
National Orphan Month

Our Adoption Journey

Our adoption journey has been years in the making. We first discussed it before we were even married. Mike is adopted and he told me early on that we would probably adopt someday.

As the years passed, Mike and I both started to feel the call to adopt, but there always seemed to be yet another job transfer or a hectic move that would shift us away from that. (There were 17 of them in 19 years!) Often, we didn't understand God's timing and sometimes wondered if He was still calling us to adopt.

After living in this area for three years, that call tugged on our hearts once again. We had seen friends and church families adopt. One family that had a great impact on us was the Frommacks. They returned from Ethiopia with siblings in September of 2010. It was a beautiful thing to see God knit this family together and it made us know without a doubt that we also wanted to adopt...and soon!

A few weeks after the Frommacks returned from Ethiopia, I met a lady named Joan Hunter at a friend's house. She was in the process of adopting a nine-year-old boy from China's Special Needs program. I was completely drawn in and had about a thousand questions for her. Joan, who had adopted four other children, explained the Special Needs program and it sounded like the perfect fit for our family. Each family would decide what needs they were comfortable with and go from there. The needs ranged from extremely minor to those involving full time care.

I went home and started looking into the China Special Needs program immediately. I explained everything to Mike and he agreed that this was right for us. It was exactly what we'd been praying for. We both knew that we were ready to adopt, but we wanted to downsize first, so we put our house on the market, thinking we'd sell it quickly and have more resources to adopt. But after several months on the market, Mike and I both felt God impress upon us that a move would come later, but right now, it was time to adopt.

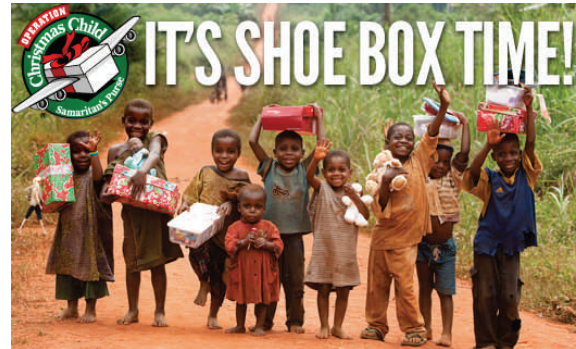
We took the house off the market the next day and started pursuing the file of the little girl we had found on a Special Needs/Waiting Children website. We were given Provisional Approval for her (Layla, as we called her) and thought all was well. Unfortunately, a long-awaited medical update came three months later. It showed that her medical issues were much more severe and the orphanage wanted to cancel the adoption as her health was declining rapidly. This news was devastating to us. In our eyes, Layla was already our daughter and we took the news hard. At this point, we were too upset to look for another child on any of the Waiting Child lists. We prayed and decided to let God bring us the right child.

About a month after we had gotten the news, our agency sent us the file of another little girl with the same special need. She is absolutely perfect for our family. Some have said she even looks like a Degan! As challenging as our journey was, we know that God's will and timing are perfect. In fact, our daughter, Jia Mei, was not even on the list to be adopted when we first started the process. God gave us Layla as our "daughter in our hearts" and she will be in our hearts and prayers always. God also gave us Jia, who will be our daughter to love and raise, here in our home. In fact, she will be here sometime this December. We feel truly blessed and know that we will have an extra special Christmas this year!

Operation Christmas Child

The mission of Operation Christmas Child is to demonstrate God's love in a tangible way to needy children around the world, and together with the local church worldwide, to share the Good News of Jesus Christ. Last year our local area sent over 27,000 shoe boxes to children all around the world. Blue Ridge Bible Church collected over 1500 of that number. If you have never participated in Operation Christmas Child before, here are some basic instructions for packing a shoe box gift.



1. GIFT IDEAS

TOYS – small cars, balls, dolls, stuffed animals, kazoos, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, small Etch A Sketch®, toys that light up or make noise (with extra batteries), Slinky®, etc.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES – pens, pencils and sharpener, crayons or markers, stamps and ink pad sets, writing pads or paper, solar calculators, coloring and picture books, etc.

HYGIENE ITEMS – toothbrush, toothpaste, mild bar soap (in a plastic bag), comb, washcloth, etc.

OTHER – Hard candy and lollipops (please double bag all candy), mints, gum, T-shirts, socks, ball caps; sunglasses, hair clips, toy jewelry, watches, flashlights (with extra batteries)

A PERSONAL NOTE – In a separate envelope, you may enclose a note to the child and a photo of yourself or your family. If you include your name and address, the child may write back.

DO NOT INCLUDE – Used or damaged items; war-related items such as toy guns, knives or military figures; chocolate or food; out-of-date candy; liquids or lotions; medications or vitamins; breakable items such as snowglobes or glass containers; aerosol cans

Use an empty shoe box (standard size, please) or a small plastic container with lid. You can wrap the box (lid separately), but wrapping is not required. Most importantly, pray for the child who will receive your gift.

2. BOY OR GIRL?

Determine whether your gift will be for a boy or a girl, and the child's age category: 2-4, 5-9, or 10-14. Print out the appropriate boy/girl label by using a brochure provided for you at the drop-off site or downloading the artwork from samaritanspurse.org. Mark the correct age category on the label, and tape the label to the top of your box.

3. FILL WITH GIFTS

Fill the box with a variety of gifts that will bring delight to a child.

4. INCLUDE YOUR DONATION

Please donate \$7 or more for each shoe box you prepare to help cover shipping and other project costs. If you or your family are preparing more than one shoe box, please make one combined donation. You can also give online at Samritan'sPurse.org/OCC and print out a barcode that will tell you exactly where your box is sent!

5. DROP OFF

November 14-19 you can bring your boxes to the Blue Ridge Bible Church auditorium, Monday through Friday, 4pm to 8pm & Saturday 9am to 12 noon.

We are so excited to see how God will use YOU in this ministry this year!
